## **2020 is more than a little bit different. So what does that mean for you as a new Year 7?**

This has been a strange few months, with nothing happening the way that any of us had planned. We know that you may be upset that you haven't been able to do all of the things you wanted to do to end Year 6... even the SATs! And we are disappointed that we haven't been able to show you around our school properly, but don't worry! All of the Year 7s will be feeling the same as you and all you need to know is that you are now part of the Little Heath Family and we will do everything we can to make your transition to secondary school as special, smooth and positive as we can. So, no more focusing on what hasn't happened or won't happen, time to look at what we WILL do to make you feel safe, happy and confident at Little Heath.

The first thing is that we want you to read through this booklet and if you, or your parents or carers, have any questions, you can email them to this special email address and we will make sure that we answer them [transition@littleheath.org.uk](mailto:transition@littleheath.org.uk) We will then be running some online meetings where you get a chance to see some of our staff. We will also send out some more videos from key people and students to help you to get to know a few more of us before you arrive. Ask your parents to keep an eye out for emails from us, so you don't miss anything.

We will be sending you a Transition Booklet for you to complete over the school holidays to help us to get to know you even better! There will be prizes for impressive booklets, so show us what you can do!

We have spent quite a long time talking to your primary schools about you, finding out what you are like, what you like doing and what you are like as learners. We then work really hard to try to find some other students like you to put together in a tutor group. You will usually be with some people from your primary school (unless you're the only one!) but we really want you to try to find some new friends, so we will look to match you up with some people like you! So, come on your first day with a positive mind-set and look forward to the new people you're going to meet. Remember, it's completely normal to have a bit of a nervous tummy on the first day... that will go away, we promise! More about your first day a bit later.

# So, a little bit about Little Heath...

## Little Heath School Past, Present and Future!

LHS has over 1650 students and approximately 100 teachers. When the school opened in 1962 it had just 155 students and 9 teachers! There were only 90 students in Year 7. Some of them may have been your grandparents!

When the school opened, it was a lot smaller than it is now and centred on the A block. By September 1966, it had 628 students.

In 1971 LHS became a comprehensive school. The Modern Languages area was built and the area that is now the Inclusion Department. In 1986 the Drama Studio was added on.

The Music rooms were built in the 1970s and extended in 2002. Also in the 1970s the old History huts were built. These were there for 15 years and finally went in 1993 to be replaced with the present History block. Also in 1993 we received nine new teaching rooms in addition to our Business Studies suite. These house Geography, RE and two ICT rooms. In more recent years we have added a purpose built Mathematics suite and Art facility. Our new state of the art Sixth Form Centre opened in October 2015 and next year we are incredibly excited to welcome our massive new building with amazing facilities. You will definitely get the most out of the new building! Make sure that you have a look at the plans in main reception when you get to school and you definitely will not be able to miss the building site! More about that later.

## Important things you need to know...

### WHERE DO I GO ON MY FIRST DAY?

On your first day at LHS, you need to come to main reception where Mrs Jessop (Head of Year), Mrs Rayner (Assistant Head of Key Stage 3), Ms Button (Deputy Headteacher) and all the Year 7 Tutors will be there to meet you. You will meet Mr Ramsden and the other members of the Senior Leadership Team in the Main Hall. Make sure that you bring your completed Transition Booklet with you!

Your Form Tutor will then take you to your Form Room and spend some time with you. He/she will give you your timetable, note book and answer any questions you may have. You will spend lots of time with your tutor and the rest of your tutor group. Here we will spend time making sure that you get to know one another, feel safe, reassured and positive. You will have a tour of the school and generally just settle in.

### WHAT IS THE SCHOOL DAY LIKE?

The school day begins at 8.50am and ends at 3.25pm

You will spend 10 minutes at the start of every day with your form tutor. Here you will have the register called and will do quick uniform and equipment checks, so if you have forgotten something, here's the time to ask your tutor for help.

All of our lessons are 1 hour long and you will go to a different classroom for each lesson. Most teachers will have a seating plan and ask you to sit where they would like you to be.

You will see that break is at 11am and lunch is at 1.20pm. Many students eat some of their lunch or a snack at break time as they are not used to having their lunch so late. It might take a little bit of getting used to after the earlier lunches at primary school.

PM registration starts at 2.05 until 2.25 and there are different activities each day, one day will be an assembly, another a quiz, another numeracy ninjas or literacy work, some silent reading and circle time. (This is where you will discuss a variety of topics and really get to know one another).

We work on a two week timetable – Week 1 and Week 2 – so you will need to learn ten days of lessons, which is not easy! It is, therefore, all the more important that you pack your bag the night before, so that you avoid any panic in the mornings. Lots of students have a copy of their timetable up somewhere in their kitchen, like the fridge, or on a board in their bedroom and loads take a photo of it on their phone so they can look at it easily at home and make sure they are prepared for each day. Try to get into a routine that works for you. We don't advise you bringing all of your books every day... it's heavy and they'll get scruffy in your bag. We like everyone to keep their books nice and tidy.

## Homework at Little Heath

We believe that homework is very important. We use an online recording system called Satchel One (It used to be called 'Show My Homework', so some people still call it that, or SMHW) which you will be shown how to use when you start LHS. Make sure you check the 'Satchel One' site every day.

It is a good idea to start homework on the day it is given. That way, it is fresh in your mind, and you will remember it better. Some students do it as soon as they get home, others have a break and then get it done later. It's good to get into a routine and find somewhere quiet at home to work. Talk to your parents/carers about where you feel you will work best.

Here are some tips to help you be successful with your homework:

- **PREPARATION** Rule off your last piece of work. Put the TITLE and underline it. Write the DATE and underline it. Remember to write HWK in the margin (or in French 'Devoirs').
- **CONTENT** Think carefully about what you want to write. Do the work carefully and neatly. Cross mistakes out neatly with one line.
- **DIAGRAMS** Always draw these in pencil. Remember to label them clearly and give them a title. Use a ruler for drawing straight lines.
- **WORKSHEETS** If you have to stick things in your book, trim them to fit, and stick in carefully.
- **COMPUTERS/THE INTERNET** Most teachers will be happy for you to complete homework on your computer. Remember to ensure the work is your own, so avoid copy and paste and reference your sources.

- **IMPROVING YOUR WRITING** Always proof read your work through and neatly correct any mistakes. Try to get an adult to look at your work when you have finished, and then take note of the comments you receive. Remember to look back at the targets you were given with the previous piece of work to try to avoid making the same mistakes.
- **CHECKING HOMEWORK** Make sure that you and your parent/carer check what homework you have on Show My Homework each day.
- **HANDING IN** Be sure to hand in your work on time. The submission date is shown on Show My Homework.

**Important!** Always make sure you understand what you have to do before you leave the classroom. If you are not certain about the instructions, PLEASE ASK! Your teacher will want to help you. If you get home and cannot remember, or are struggling, you can always email them or send them a message through Satchel One... then they will be able to help you. Email addresses are on the website and on Satchel One.

## How do I improve my homework?

When your homework has been marked and given back to you, look at it carefully. Read your teacher's comment. **WWW** -What went well? What are you proud of? Don't be shy of feeling good when you've done something well. At Little Heath we like to praise good work and effort... including ourselves! Then look at **EBI** -Even Better If..? What is your teacher's advice? Could you have done the work in a better way? What can you do to improve in the future? **Learn** from what has been written. When you are asked to improve or 'upgrade' your work, please do this in purple pen.

## How do I make sure that my homework doesn't build up?

Some evenings you will have more homework set than on other evenings. Try to plan ahead to ensure you are not trying to complete several pieces of homework on one night. Satchel One indicates how long most homeworks should take.

If you get in a muddle with your homework, please speak to a teacher. We want to help you and we would much prefer you to be honest about finding things difficult. We will always help you.

## What can I do if I finish all of my homework?

Remember that **reading** is one of the best forms of homework as it increases your general knowledge, vocabulary and improves your written work. Do not wait to be asked or reminded. If you have a quiet evening, rather than putting the television or a computer game on, **read** for a while; it really is very good for you and can be lots of fun.

Why not ask your teacher for some other tasks to do?

Or you could do some additional research, watch youtube clips on your favourite subject or watch a tv programme about it, or look more things up. Teachers are learners too and they will love to hear about any additional things you have been doing in their subject!

## What do I do if I find a subject too hard or I cannot do the homework?

If you have any problems in this area, then the first person you should speak to is your subject teacher. He/she is there to help, and you should discuss any difficulties with them first. If this is for any reason impossible, speak to your Form Tutor. He/she could help you by talking to your subject teacher on your behalf, and is always there to help with any problems, big or small. Please don't be afraid to talk to your teachers and ask them for help. It's what we are here for! No-one wants to think of you struggling, so please ask or email them if it easier.

## **If I continue to have problems with a particular subject what can I do?**

Any major problems or concerns should be discussed with the Head of Department, your Form Tutor or Head of Year, who will make sure they are resolved as soon as possible. We are always willing to listen and want to help you. The same applies if you are having problems with any other students; speak to your Form Tutor or Head of Year who will help you to put things right.

## **What is Praise and Reward like at LHS?**

There is a House System at LHS. Teachers award house points for reasons such as positive contributions in lessons, excellent homework, resilience or a great attitude to learning. In addition, house points can be given for representing the school in sport or contributing to a school event, being kind to others or making a contribution to the school community. Our houses are Arundel, Conway, Stirling and Warwick and you will find out which house you are in when you find out which tutor group you are in. If you have a brother or sister at LHS you will not necessarily be in the same house. We believe it is most important put you in the tutor group that is right for you, rather than purely based on families. It also makes it more fun at home when your house is beating your brother or sister's!

Our motto in KS3 is 'Spread Kindness and Celebrate Success'. We feel very strongly that we want our students to feel proud of their achievements and we will encourage you to nominate other people in your class for praise. Heads of Year run praise assemblies where we share the good work, progress and behaviour of our students on a regular basis. House assemblies take place in the sports hall where Heads of House will give prizes to people with the highest number of praise points!

We also encourage you to thank your teachers through our KS3 nominations process each half term. It is great for teachers to receive thanks from you... it really means a lot to them!

## **How will my parents/carers know how I am doing at school?**

Your parents/carers are always welcome to contact us at school. You will also have three reports during Year 7 (we call them 'Performance Reviews' at LHS). The introductory review just shows how well you've settled in and it will be accompanied by an Introductory Evening for Parents with your form tutor and the one later in the year gives more information about progress in each subject. There is a Parents' Evening in the Summer Term and a final End of Year Report.

## **What should I do if I feel unhappy or worried about something or someone?**

In this case there are many people around who can help you. Firstly, tell your Form Tutor and they will be happy to help you. If you cannot find your Form Tutor then go to either Mr Linz or look out for members the Smile Team (more on this later) or the Key Stage 3 office to see Mrs Jessop, Mrs Harper or Mrs Baker at the nearest opportunity. Ms Button and Mrs Rayner are also around to help you. Please do not hold a worry in. We are here to help you and do not want you to worry.

## **What should I do if I get lost? Will I get into trouble?**

This is the thing that most students worry about, but you don't need to. If you are not sure where your next lesson is, ask your teacher to help you find your way to the next lesson. If you get lost, ask any student or teacher, they understand how you feel and they will want to help you. If you cannot see anyone, either pop your head into a classroom and ask the teacher for help, or go to KS3 Office or main reception... we will make sure that you are helped. Teachers understand that it takes some time to get used to the school, so you will not get told off.

## What should I do if I am having problems with other students?

In the first instance, speak to your Form Tutor who will talk to you about the best way of dealing with it. If there is a problem in a lesson then speak to that subject teacher. If a problem continues, make sure that you go back to the teacher because they might not know. You can always talk to the KS3 Office about any problems you have.

## What do I do if I need to leave school for an appointment?

If you have a medical or dental appointment, or need to be out of school for part of the day, then you will need to get a **'signing out slip'** from Mrs Baker in the Key Stage 3 office (History Block). You will need to show a note from your parent/carer to confirm the time you need to leave school and what the appointment is for i.e.; Doctor, Dentist, Optician etc.

**'Signing out slips'** are only issued on the day you need to leave school for your appointment – they are not issued in advance. You can get them from Key Stage 3 office first thing in the morning, at break or at lunchtime.

If your appointment is first thing in the morning and you are not coming into school, then you do **not** need a signing out slip. Your parent/carer, however, must leave a message on the absence line to inform the school you will not be attending morning registration. You must report to Main Reception when you arrive at school and sign in and have a note from your parents detailing why you are late into school.

When you are leaving school, you must go to Main Reception and write your name in the signing out book and write the name of the person who gave you permission – this is usually your Head of Year. If you return to school after your appointment, **please do not forget** to sign back in at Main Reception. This is in case the fire alarm rings or a teacher is looking for you as the school must know who is here at all times.

## What do I do if I feel ill whilst I am in school?

If you start to feel ill whilst you are at school you should make a member of staff aware immediately. If this is during a lesson you will need written permission from your teacher to visit Main Reception where the First Aid staff will assess if you need a painkiller. If you feel well enough to stay in school the staff will make a note and give you further advice. If you are not well enough to remain in school, the staff will contact your parent/carer to be collected and taken home. First Aid staff cannot deal with injuries that have happened at home prior to coming into school.

If you are on prescribed medication which needs to be taken whilst you are at school, your parent/carer should send this in to Main Reception in a clearly labelled bag with written instructions about when it should be taken.

## What do I do if I get into school later than 8.50am?

If you are late to school you will need to enter through the main gates at the front of school. A member of staff will be there between 8:50am and 9.15am and will ask you why you are late. If you do not have an acceptable explanation (accompanied by a written note from home) you will be set a lunchtime detention for 25 minutes that day. If you arrive after this time you need to sign in at Main Reception and again you will receive a Same Day sanction (SDS) for one hour after school. If there is a reason for your lateness you will require a letter from home or your parent/carer should contact Main Reception.

## Will I need my PE kit on my first day?

**No.** Even if you are timetabled to have P.E. on your first day, your teacher will spend time with you explaining safety rules and answering questions.

## **Am I allowed to cycle to school**

Yes, providing you have a roadworthy bike, are careful, and obey the Highway Code at all times. For your own safety, we advise you wear a cycle helmet. Your bike must also be locked when in the cycle sheds in school. It is a good idea to have a security number stamped on your bike. You are not allowed to ride your bike on school site.

## **What should I do if I lose something?**

Firstly, look carefully for the item yourself. Then ask your form or subject teacher, who may be able to help you. Finally, Main Reception collects lost property, so go and see them at break or lunchtime. They will return all named items, so please make sure that you label **all** your own property, including uniform.

## **What should I do about money, keys and personal belongings?**

Large amounts of money and expensive items should not be brought to school. Under no circumstances should you leave money or personal belongings unattended. You can hand in these items during PE and Drama lessons.

## **What should I do about letters that go home?**

We use an electronic mailing system called 'In Touch' to communicate most information to parents. However, occasionally we need to send home paper copies of correspondence. If any of the communications include a Reply Slip, please complete and return in an envelope labelled with your name and tutor group.

## **What happens at lunch time?**

Our school canteen is run by a company called Caterlink. Their aim is to provide a good choice of well balanced hot and cold food. They operate a cashless biometric (fingerprint) service where your parent/carer is able to place money on your account via ParentMail. You then use your finger image/scan to pay for food.

They have a main restaurant area where hot snacks, sandwiches, various salad selections, fresh fruit salad pots, variety of cold drinks and home cooked main meals are served.

They also run a breakfast service from 8.00am each day where students can purchase a range of breakfast items.

A large snack shack is situated in the middle of the school and provides a range of healthy options, including homemade soup, cold sandwiches, pizza, salad, pasta pots, fruit juices, homemade cakes, still drinks and healthy snacks. The snack shack is covered by a large canopy and there is outdoor seating available.

To encourage students to follow a healthy diet Caterlink incorporates various meal deals and themed lunches throughout the school year.

You do not have to buy your lunch. You can bring a packed lunch from home to eat in our designated outside areas when the weather is fine or indoors in wet weather.

Water fountains are situated around the school and you can fill up your water bottles at break and lunchtime.

Lunchtime is often a time for you to meet up with friends, have chat and lunch outside. In colder weather you can use your tutor room to have your lunch.

Some people play football on the field or MUGA (astroturf) and others make use of our table tennis courts, or attend one of our many clubs.

Some students use the library at lunchtime to read, study, do homework or meet friends for quiet chat.

## Are there clubs for me to attend?

Yes! Little Heath offers a wide variety of clubs at lunchtimes and after school. They are an important part of school life and we would really encourage you to try something new! Some clubs we offer in Year 7 include a Science Club, Art Club, Homework Hub, Drama Productions and a range of Sporting Clubs including football, netball, hockey, trampolining and athletics. Details of clubs on offer are issued to parents, carers and students each September.

## LITTLE HEATH SCHOOL LIBRARY

*“The Library is not only a fun place to be it’s a place to connect, to share, to grow and to expand your horizons!”*

The Library is here for your benefit and enjoyment and we hope you start using it as soon as you arrive at the school. Computers are available for you to use and it’s an ideal place to do your homework, do some research or read quietly. The Library staff are always happy to help you.

**Fiction** books are shelved either in alphabetical order using the author’s surname, or on the ‘Quick Read’ spinners.

**Non-fiction** (factual) books are shelved by subject. All books are given a number and are on the shelves in number order, this is called a ‘Dewey’ number.

The School Library System is available as an icon on the desktop of all computers within school, which means you can easily access it to see what books we have and it also shows links to really useful websites. In Year 7 you will have some lessons in the Library where we will talk to you about how to choose a good book and how to use the School Library System to search for books.

You will be participating in the Accelerated Reader program. This means that you will take a STAR reading test which will determine your reading level. You can then pick a book in your level and then when you have finished it you will take a short quiz on the computer. This means we can check that you have understood what you have been reading, and from the results of your quizzes your teacher can set your reading targets and help with the selection of books.

## BORROWING BOOKS

You can borrow books from the Library and you can have up to four books on loan to you at one time. Any books you wish to borrow **must** be registered on the computer by Library staff – simply go to the desk where your book will be issued, stamped and handed back to you. There is a security system in the library, so any books not issued to you will set off the alarm.

Books are loaned for two weeks after which they must be renewed or returned.

The date for return is always stamped in the front of the book when it is issued to you. Please make sure you check your book is not overdue. Other people may want to use the books you have borrowed; it is therefore **very important** that you return books on time.

## What is DEAR time?

DEAR means Drop Everything And Read. Every day all students in Y7-9 have 20 minutes of silent reading. We start in Week 1 with reading every period 1 that week, the second week it’s Period 2, the third week of term is period 3 and so on, so, quick quiz for you... which period will it be in Week 6 of term? Don’t worry if you don’t know, your teachers will remind you because they will be reading too. All you need to do is remember your reading book every day.

# Some tips from older students about how to organise yourself...

- Pack your school bag the night before and check your lessons on your timetable. Lots of students colour code their timetable as they find it easier to see the different subjects.
- Your school bag should be big enough to take A4 folders and books without corners being bent. It's good to get one with pockets so you can find things easily.
- Make sure everything has your name on it! It's so easy to lose a coat and there are more than 1600 students!
- You should take the following to school every day:
  - Pencil case – pens, pencils, coloured pencils, rubber, pencil sharpener, ruler and maths equipment (calculator, protractor, compass and set square). Lots of students also bring coloured pens and highlighters.
  - Calculators and other stationery can be purchased from the Resources Shop. The Art Department also sells good value Art equipment.
  - Some students have plastic wallets to keep papers and notes in. They can really help to keep things tidy in your bag and make sure you don't lose things.
  - Books/folders which you will need for the day
  - You must also remember your homework and reading book for DEAR time (Drop Everything And Read... more info later)
  - Don't forget to bring a packed lunch or make sure you have money in your school account to use the canteen. (Your parents will have more info on how to do this).
  - A water bottle – you can feel up at various places around school
  - It's good to have some hand sanitiser in your bag, just in case you want to use it.
  - Lots of students put a spare plastic bag in the bag just in case something gets spilt or dirty.
  - To help with your spelling you could bring a small pocket dictionary to school. A French dictionary is also a good idea.
- Regularly check Satchel One (Show My Homework) and using the calendar view helps to keep things organised. Lots of students download the app to their phones. Don't forget to save your password somewhere safe, so you don't forget it.
- You are allowed to bring mobile phones into school at your own risk but should be switched off and in the bottom of the bag at all times. You are not allowed to use your phone during the day and if you are seen with your phone, it will be confiscated and a parent/carer will have to collect it for you at the end of the day.

- When I first went through the LHS gates I was really glad I chose to come here.
- I remember making friends on my first day at LHS and they are still my friends now (a Year 11 student).
